Dream Big Homeschool: February Curriculum - Celebrating Black History & Heroes (Ages 2-12)

- Art Supplies: Construction paper (various colors), crayons, markers, paint (various colors), paintbrushes, glue (sticks and liquid), scissors, glitter, yarn, beads, clay, modeling dough, recycled materials (cardboard tubes, boxes, plastic bottles), fabric scraps, felt, googly eyes.
- Writing Supplies: Paper (lined and plain), pencils, pens, journals, notebooks, index cards.
- **Books:** Age-appropriate biographies, storybooks, poetry collections, folktales, myths (check your local library!).
- **Music:** Access to various genres of African and Black music (streaming services, library collections).
- **Videos/Documentaries:** Age-appropriate documentaries and films related to Black history and culture (check streaming services, libraries).
- Other: Computer/tablet with internet access, printer (optional), maps (of Africa and specific regions), timelines, rulers, measuring tape, scales, counters (beans, buttons, colorful beads), graph paper, dice, playing cards, stopwatches, magnifying glass, seeds, soil, containers for planting, materials for building (LEGOs, blocks, recycled materials), simple tools (screwdrivers, hammers for older children with supervision), baking ingredients (for science experiments in the kitchen), dress-up clothes, puppets, board games (checkers, chess), musical instruments (shakers, drums, recorders), balloons, string, glue gun (with adult supervision).

Week 1: African Roots - "Celebrating Heritage!"

(2-5): Music and Movement!

- Activity 1: Drum Circle: Explore African drumming rhythms. *Activity:* Use pots, pans, or drums (if available) to create your own drum circle. Dance and move to the rhythms.
- Activity 2: Story Time: Read African folktales and myths.

 Activity: Act out the stories using puppets or dramatic play.

(6-9): Exploring Traditions!

- Activity 1: Cultural Crafts: Research traditional African crafts (e.g., beading, weaving, mask-making). *Activity:* Create your own craft inspired by these traditions.
- Activity 2: Storytelling Circle: Activity: Share stories and create your own folktales inspired by African traditions.

(10-12): Ancient Civilizations!

- Activity 1: Kingdom Research: Research ancient African kingdoms (e.g., Ghana, Mali, Songhai). *Activity:* Create a presentation or write a report about their history, culture, and achievements.
- Activity 2: Trade and Innovation: Activity: Explore the contributions of these kingdoms to trade, science, and technology.

Tuesday: African Royalty - "Crowns and Kingdoms!"

(2-5): Royal Dress-Up & Play!

- Activity 1: Majestic Attire: Explore pictures of African kings and queens in their royal garments. *Activity:* Dress up as royalty. Make your own crowns and jewelry.
- Activity 2: Royal Stories & Songs: Read stories about royalty. Sing songs or play African-inspired music. Activity:

Act out the stories. Have a "royal parade."

• Activity 3: Kingdom Building: Use blocks or boxes to create a "royal castle." Fill it with stuffed animals.

(6-9): Kingdom Builders & Storytellers!

- Activity 1: Design a Palace: Research African palaces.

 Activity: Design your own palace using building materials.
- Activity 2: Royal Symbols & Stories: Learn about royal symbols. *Activity:* Create your own symbols. Write a short story about a fictional royal.

(10-12): History, Legacy, & Debate!

- Activity 1: Research a Royal Figure: Research a specific African king or queen. Activity: Create a presentation or report.
- Activity 2: Debate the Role of Royalty: Discuss the role of royalty. Activity: Hold a debate about the advantages and disadvantages of a monarchy.

Wednesday: Black Inventors and Scientists - "Innovators!"

(2-5): Exploring the World!

- Activity 1: Simple Machines: Explore simple machines. *Activity:* Build simple machines using household items.
- Activity 2: Nature Walk: Observe plants and animals. Activity: Draw pictures of what you see.

(6-9): Inventions and Discoveries!

• Activity 1: Inventor Spotlight: Research Black scientists and inventors. Activity: Create a poster or presentation.

 Activity 2: Design Your Own Invention: Activity: Design your own invention. Draw a blueprint and explain how it works.

- Activity 1: Research a Scientist: Choose a Black scientist or inventor to research. Activity: Write a biography or create a documentary.
- Activity 2: Science Experiment: Activity: Conduct a science experiment related to the work of a Black scientist or inventor.

- Activity 1: Role Models: Research Black leaders and activists. *Activity:* Write a biography or create a presentation.
- Activity 2: Making a Difference: Activity: Brainstorm ways to make a positive difference.

(10-12): Change Makers!

- Activity 1: Research and Debate: Research social justice issues. *Activity:* Hold a debate.
- Activity 2: Community Action: Activity: Plan and carry out a community service project.

Week 2: The Civil Rights Movement - "Standing Up for Equality!"

(Monday): Seeds of Change

(2-5): Sharing and Fairness

• Activity 1: Sharing Toys: Practice sharing toys and taking turns. Discuss why sharing is important.

 Activity 2: Fairness Discussion: Talk about what it means to be fair and treat everyone equally. Read stories about fairness.

(6-9): Understanding Segregation

- Activity 1: What is Segregation?: Discuss the concept of segregation and how it separated people based on their race. Use simple examples to illustrate the concept.
